Message



As I reflect on the 2023-2024 school year at Hope Academy, I am filled with optimism for our future. Hope Academy's journey, now spanning 19 years, continues to be marked by growth, with a commitment to our mission of supporting teens impacted by substance use disorder (SUD) while they work towards earning their high school diplomas.

In last year's report, I shared about the evolving landscape of adolescent treatment programs and our promise to step up as a leader in this space. Hope Academy has made significant strides in addressing the critical gaps in treatment services for our students. This past year, we hired an in-house therapist, a move that has greatly enhanced our ability to provide immediate and continuous support for our students. This addition, alongside our occupational therapy (OT) program, has had a significant impact on not only our students, but also their families and our staff

The in-house therapist at Hope Academy has provided essential therapeutic support during the school day, creating access to services and eliminating barriers like transportation. Parents can now rest assured that their children are receiving the support they need without having to miss school or for parents to take time off work. This seamless integration of therapy within the school day has created more stability within our school community.

Our enhanced occupational therapy program has also played a crucial role in our school. By focusing on self-regulation, concentration, and other essential skills, our OT program has helped students manage their emotions and behaviors more effectively, leading to better academic and personal outcomes. The training provided to our staff has ensured that these benefits are felt in classrooms as well.

One of our proudest achievements this year is the success of our graduates. Every single member of our graduating class has moved on to either college or trade school. At Hope Academy, we are preparing our students with the tools and resources to pursue future aspirations.

This work is not possible without you. Thank you for your support of Indiana's recovery high school. Because of you, we are able to help our students and build a stronger foundation for our community.






Gender



Enrollment by County




Grades Represented

SETTING GOALS

Within and outside the classroom, setting goals is crucial for building confidence and motivation. Our OT program provides a structured approach to goal setting, helping alleviate worries and anxieties.

CIRCLE TIME

Mondays are all about setting the tone for the week ahead. During circle time, we encourage students to be purposeful with their goals. By remembering and following up on these goals throughout the week, we reinforce their significance, fostering a sense of accountability and progress.

MOTIVATIONAL INTERVIEWING

When students face challenges in achieving their goals, our teachers and staff are equipped with motivational interviewing techniques to guide them through the process. From identifying barriers to brainstorming solutions, we empower students to take ownership of their progress.

It's our goal to nurture confident, resilient young people who are ready to tackle any challenge life throws their way and our OT program makes this possible.



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
